Again Snake whispered, '*Nobody* gets in a rhino's way. *Nobody* tells a rhino what to do. He is quite as important as Elephant.'


Rhinoceros snorted and swished his absurd little tail. Its shadow looked threatening and powerful. His voice came through closed teeth. 'Nobody tells

'It was,' nodded Twiga. 'The thoughts of his twisty mind are more dangerous than the poison in his teeth.'


Rhino was resting in the shade. Every thought that crossed his mind started with I, or me, or my. Snake glided up to him and with a sneer in his soft
